Faculty can utilize MSS for the following purposes:

Evaluating Multilingual Students' Needs

Conduct assessments to evaluate students' proficiency in both their native language and English, identifying language areas (listen, speak, read, and write) where they may need additional support. Provide cultural orientations in American classrooms.

Enhancing Students' English Proficiency

Provide 1-on-1 tutoring in both English and the student's native language to assist with comprehension and coursework. ESL courses are available for them to take to improve English abilities, including ESL 1020, ESL 1030, ESL 2010 and ENG 1055

Giving Extra Time Allowed for Assessment

Research has shown that bilingual students have more divergent thinking yet may need additional time to rephrase their ideas in a target language. Hence, MSS can proctor students' quizzes and exams with your permitted additional time and/or translational tools.

Connecting Students with Peer Support & Foreign Language Learning Courses

Connect students with peer support groups where multilingual students can share experiences, strategies, and success tips. Understanding and navigating the ability to switch between languages in different contexts.

Fostering Culturally Relevant Pedagogies

Work with faculty to develop teaching strategies that accommodate multilingual students. Develop culturally relevant resources and materials that support bilingual education and understanding.

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

Placement of Multilingual Students into Academic English Elective Courses (3 Credits/Course): Advise Your Students to Register for ESL courses

ESL 1020 - Developmental English (FALL)

This course focuses on the four key areas of language acquisition: speaking, listening, reading, writing, and a strong foundation in grammar and vocabulary, critical for both academic success and effective communication in daily life.

ESL 1030 - Success in Academic English (FALL)

The course will focus on equipping students with the strategies needed to excel in academic contexts, particularly in understanding complex texts, conducting research, and synthesizing information effectively. By honing these critical skills, students will be better prepared to succeed across their coursework and contribute meaningfully to scholarly discussions.

ESL 2010 - Advanced English (SPRING)

The course will focus on equipping students with the strategies needed to excel in academic contexts, particularly in understanding complex texts, conducting research, and synthesizing information effectively. By honing these critical skills, students will be better prepared to succeed across their coursework and contribute meaningfully to scholarly discussions.

ENG 1055 - Language and Power: a Focus on Intercultural Communication (SPRING)

A course designed to explore the dynamics of language in shaping power relations and intercultural communication! This course is particularly beneficial for students who are currently studying abroad or planning to do so, as it emphasizes developing intercultural communicative competence—a crucial skill for thriving in diverse cultural settings.
